

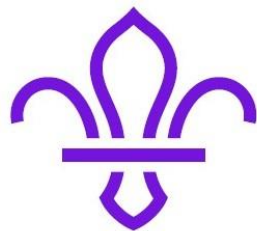

What is Scouting?

Scouting is an international movement with over 28 million members worldwide, spread through 216 countries and territories. The number of countries recognising the value of scouting and accepting its principles is increasing and there are only six countries in the world who do not offer Scouting to young people.

In total, there are 500,000 people in Membership throughout the United Kingdom. This includes about 100,000 adults who have taken up appointments as voluntary leaders, administrators and supporters.

The Scout Association in the UK accepts members of all major faiths and offers equal opportunities for both boys and girls no matter what their social, religious or ethnic background may be.

During 1991, girls were admitted to the Beaver Scout, Cub Scout and Scout sections. This complimented the admission of young women to the Venture Scout section in 1976.

During the Spring of 2002, the Scout Association launched a new programme for young people aged 6 – 25. This was the largest change to our curriculum for nearly 40 years. A careful strategy of change management was devised to help people move forward, delivering a totally new way of providing Scouting, to the 14-25 age range.

The Squirrel Section for ages 4-6 was introduced in 2021 and is slowly being rolled out across the country. At the time of writing (august 2023) there are no Squirrel Dreys in South West Cheshire.



The History of Scouting

Scouting in the UK is organised through The Scout Association. The Scout Association has a clear purpose;

'To help young people achieve their full physical, intellectual, social and spiritual potential as individuals, as responsible citizens and as members of their local, national and international communities'.

Even if we can't solve all the problems in the world, we can help make it a better place. We do this by helping young people to develop as active members of their community;

- ❖ Who are self-reliant
- ❖ Who are caring
- ❖ Who are responsible
- ❖ Who show commitment

Scouting works well when young people enjoy learning by doing in partnership with adults.

They do this by taking part in a variety of activities and new experiences exploring the outdoors participating in teams and taking responsibility for their actions.

Our method for giving young people the opportunity to learn by doing is called the programme. The programme is a seamless progression of training, activities and awards that cover everything that young people do in scouting from the ages of 6 to 25.

All adults in scouting have a responsibility to make sure that the programme is fun and exciting. We must also make sure that it is safe. The Scout Associations policies, rules, code of behaviour, advice on child protection and safety are there to help adults make sure that the young people in their care stay safe while they enjoy themselves and learn.



The Scout Promise

Scouting has a simple and positive promise that is required to be made by all members. The promise together with the Scout Law, gives a distinctive ethos to the practices of the Movement and acts as a bond with Scouts in other countries.

The three key principles are:

- ❖ Duty to self
- ❖ Duty to God
- ❖ Duty to Others

Everyone in Scouting expresses their membership and acceptance of the three key principles by taking the promise and following the scout law. Beaver Scouts and Cub Scouts have their own special Promise and Law, suitable for their age range and beliefs.

The Beaver Scout Promise;

I promise to do my best, to be kind and helpful and to love God

The Scout Promise;

Either –

*On my Honour, I promise that I will do my best,
To do my duty to God and to the King
To help other people,
And to keep the Scout Law.*

OR

*On my Honour, I promise that I will do my best,
To uphold our Scout values, to do my duty to the King,
To help other people,
And to keep the Scout Law.*

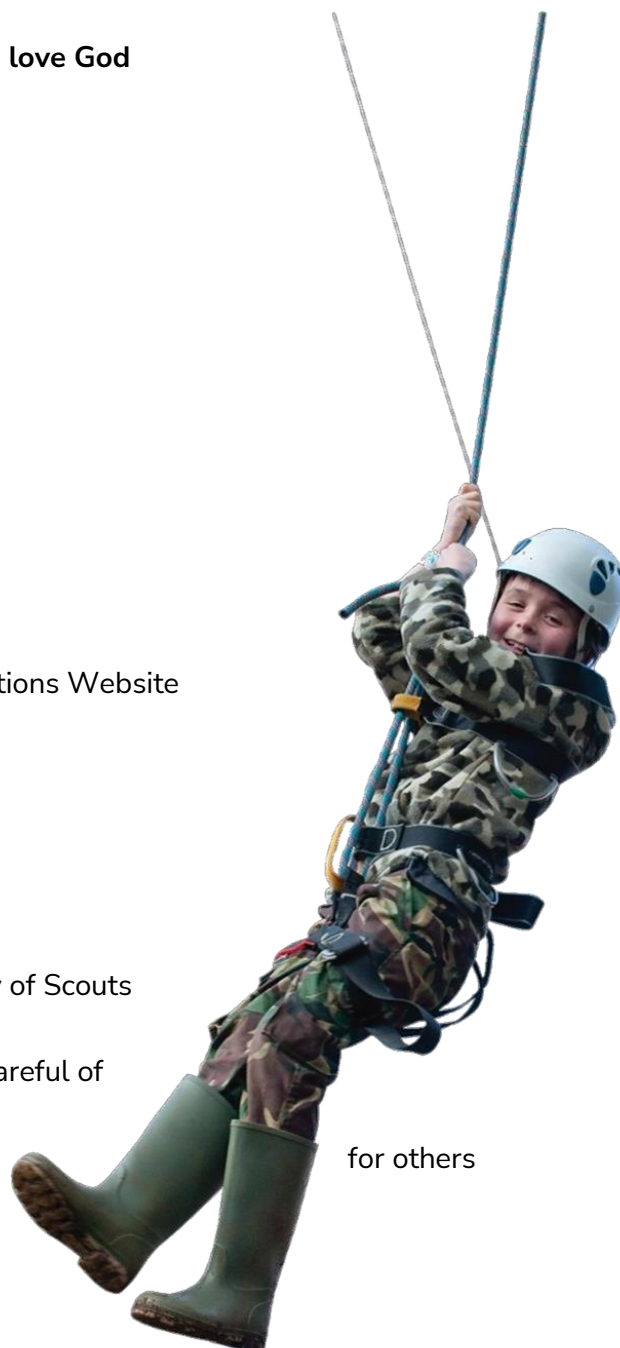

The Sections

Irrespective of a members age, a young person in the Movement is a 'Scout'.

The balanced programme spans the 6 – 25 age range which is made up of five sections. Each section has its own identity, ethos and style. They all have adult support that varies in style across the different age groups.

A Beaver Scout Colony – has members aged between 6 and 8 Years old (6-month flexibility applies)

A Cub Scout Pack – has members aged 8 – 10 ½ (6-month flexibility applies)

A Scout Troop – is for young people aged from 10 ½ - 14 years old (6-month flexibility applies)

In 2021 the Scout Association created a new Section – **Squirrel Scout Drey** – for members aged 4-6 years old. Squirrels are being rolled out across the country, but at the moment, 38th SWC has no plans to open a Squirrel Drey.

These are all part of the **Scout Group**

An Explorer Scout Unit is for young people from 14- 18 years old. Explorer Scout Units are part of a Scout District, there may be more than one Explorer Scout unit in a District and any Explorer Scout is able to Visit any of the Other Units as long as they belong to a base unit

A Scout Network is for young people aged 18 – 25 Years old. Scout Networks are the responsibility of the District.

There are several important things, which make Scouting different from many other youth organisations:

- ❖ We are a uniformed movement.
- ❖ We use 'Lodges', 'Sixes' and 'Patrols' of about 6 young people who work together, learning from and supporting each other.
- ❖ We involve young people in decision making as part of their development.

The District has an additional section called 'Scout Active Support'. This section is made up of Adults who are prepared to assist with activities and events. If you would consider helping this team, then contact details can be obtained from myself.





The Beaver Colony

A Beaver Scout Colony has members aged typically between 6 and 8 years old. They meet together as a Colony and work in small groups called 'Lodges'. A team of adults run the Beaver Scout Colony. Beavers take part in a wide range of activities. These include making things, singing, playing games, going on visits, investigating nature, listening to stories etc. They do this through taking part in a programme of activities provided by the leadership team.

Beaver Scouts:

- ❖ **Learn about themselves** – exploring their feelings and developing good habits of health and personal safety.
- ❖ **Get to know people** – finding out about people in their family, the family of Scouting, the local community and the wider world.
- ❖ **Explore** – discovering the exciting world of science, nature and technology, exploring the natural and man-made world.
- ❖ **Care** – growing towards and responding to the needs of others, the local community and the wider world.

Beaver Scouts work towards challenge awards, which are awarded by taking part in the regular programme. With hard work and regular attendance Beavers can gain their Bronze Award, the highest award a Beaver Scout can achieve.

Beaver Scouts also have the opportunity along the way to collect Activity Badges, which they can work towards both inside and outside the meeting of the Colony, in their own time if they choose.

The Cub Pack

The Cub Scout Pack has members aged between 8 – 10 ½ years old. Cub Scouts meet as a Pack and work within a variety of small groups called 'Sixes'. A team of adults will run the Cub Scout Pack, usually led by an 'Akela', some will be uniformed leaders, others may be sectional assistants, helpers or parents.

Cubs take part in a wide range of activities that are designed to be interesting and to challenge them. At the same time, they have fun, adventure and make friends along the way. They do this through taking part in a programme of activities provided by a leadership team such as; camping, playing games, trying things new and exploring the outdoors.

Cub Scouts work towards awards and badges. The Cubs Scout Membership Award is presented to new Cub Scouts once they have learnt about the traditions and history of Scouting and about being a Cub Scout today. Activity badges are specialist interest badges that can further develop a Cub Scouts interest. They can also form the basis of special events and some are geared at the whole pack working together. With hard work and regular attendance Cub Scouts can gain their Silver Award, this is the highest award in Cub Scouts.

Camps and outings are the most memorable events during the year. They are the chance to carry out activities that are not possible at the regular weekly meeting.

Akela, the Cub Scout Leader, who has overall responsibility for the Pack, will lead the Leadership team.

It is however, very much a team effort with everyone having something to offer.

The Scout Troop

A Scout Troop is for young people aged from 10 ½ - 14 years old. Scouts meet together as a troop and work within a variety of small groups called 'Patrols' lead by a Scout Patrol Leader.

The Patrol Leader works with the leadership team in setting the programme and in decisions affecting the Troop. The Patrol system is one of the important ways that young people can take responsibility for themselves and others.

A volunteer leadership team made up of uniformed leaders and other informal assistants and helpers will guide the Troop.

Scouting has a reputation as an outdoor organisation based on strong traditions of camping and other outdoor pursuits.

Scouts work towards challenge awards, culminating in the Chief Scouts Gold Award. Scouts also have the opportunity to gain a wide range of activity badges by working inside the troop and also outside. Most of the badges and awards in Scouts require independent work by the Scouts themselves.

Most Troops offer a number of events away from home during the year, and very often a summer camp. These are important to the life of the Troop, as they are the culmination of much training during the year.

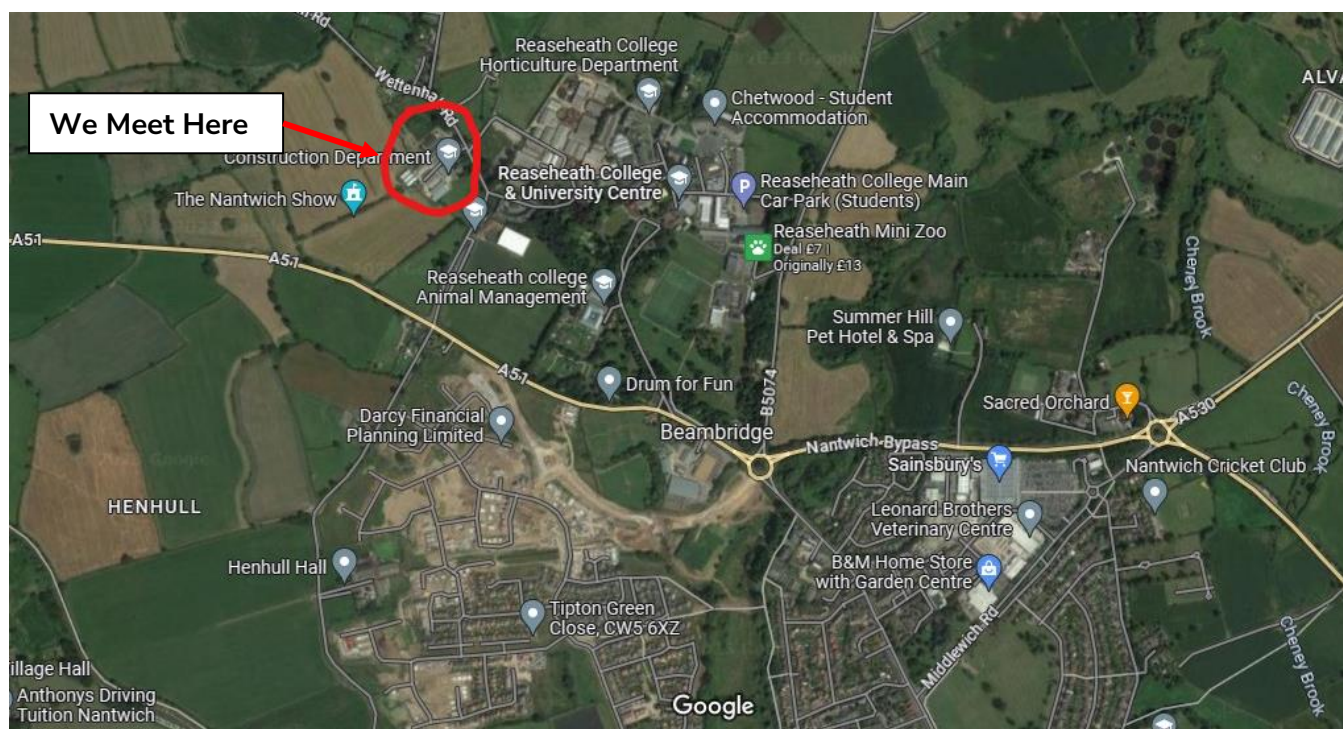

Where do we meet?

Driving from Nantwich, go west on the A51 and go past the main Reaseheath Campus. After about 0.25 miles, turn right at the turning signposted for Poole, Cholmondeston, Wettenhall and a brown box sign to “Venetian Marina”. This is Wettenhall Road. Carry on for a further 0.25 miles and after the bend to the left, Entrance 6, Construction Department is to the left. When turning into the Construction Department, please drive slowly as there will be a lot of adults and children walking around. Car Parking is a bit chaotic so please proceed with care.

How much does it cost?

Scout groups charge subscriptions to cover cost of equipment and the resources to enable us to deliver good quality scouting. Part of those subscriptions (Subs) go towards the annual membership fee paid to Headquarters (Gilwell) for the day to day running of The Scout Association that includes insurance for all members.

The current monthly subscriptions are £12.00, with a voluntary £1 donation towards the cost of a new building, for all three sections (correct at time of publication), paid by Standing Order. The Standing Order details are below on page 21.

For young people trying out Scouting for the first time, then up to 4 weeks are free.

When the young person is first invested into the group, there is a joining fee of £10 to cover their badges and Group neckerchief.

Camps, Days Out, Special Events etc, are charged separately and the cost will be dependent on the activity.

Financial Help

We appreciate that funds can sometimes be tight. If you need a bit of help with the cost of a camp, day out, uniform etc or if you want to spread the payments, then please have a quiet chat, in confidence, with one of the leaders. The Group does have a small hardship fund and there are possibilities to apply for grants/support if we are given enough time and notice.

Gift Aid

Gift Aid is the closest thing to free money as a charity can expect and it doesn't cost you a penny. It is a Government scheme where charitable donations are exempt from Income Tax. The Group is able to claim the amount you have paid in income tax on any donation, provided you have provided us with a signed declaration that you, or the person making the donation are a UK taxpayer.

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So for example, for the £12 pcm Subscription payment, the Group can claim a further £3 as this is the Income Tax you have paid. If parents/carers share payments, then it is best that all payers make a declaration.

There is a gift aid form included on Page 27 in this pack. Please print and sign.

How do I join?

Once we have received an application, the details of the Young Person are entered onto our Waiting List. Sometimes we can offer a position in the appropriate section straightaway. Sadly, we often have to ask parents to wait until a space is available. Numbers in each Section are limited by the space of the Meeting room and the number of adult volunteers that can attend regularly. The more adults, the more places we can have and the more variety in activities we can offer.

Once a member of the group, young people are guaranteed a space in the next section as they progress.

We make every effort to accommodate siblings of existing members, however there is no automatic entry for siblings – they must be added to the waiting list in the normal manner.

How do I put a name on the waiting list?

Please use the form at the back of this pack.

You will need to provide the name and date of birth of the young person and your contact details.

The Membership Secretary will be in touch when you register to confirm receipt and what will happen next.

Is there anything I can do to get my young person a place?

We accept people into the Group depending on their age and how long they have been on the waiting list, that is fair. However, there is a way to move yourself up the waiting list...

Volunteer! Not only does this help us increase the size in each Section, we give priority to children of leaders and regular helpers, as without these people there would be not Group!

Membership Details

The Scout Association in the United Kingdom is a membership organisation. To enable it to operate and communicate with its members – it is necessary to maintain accurate records.

This will include details of names; address; date of Birth; contact telephone numbers; emails address's along with your son or daughters progress through Scouting (e.g. badges gained). Information held in our Scout Group may be shared from time to time within Scouting including National Headquarters of the Scout Association for Census and other statistical information.

Legislation came into force in March 2000 that covers the protection and processing of personal data. Adults and young people have the same rights under the Data Protection Act 1998. The Act covers paper based (as well as digital) information.

Certain information is classed by the law as 'Sensitive Personal Data'. In a Scouting context, this may include information about your son's or daughter's:

- ❖ Health – to ensure that we are prepared for medical emergencies it is important that we hold relevant information
- ❖ Disabilities – to ensure a safe integration of your child's participation in activities, details of any disability need to be known.
- ❖ Religious or similar beliefs – this will help us ensure that we make appropriate arrangements when necessary.
- ❖ Racial or Ethnic origin – this will again help us to ensure that we are sensitive to cultural needs of our Members.
- ❖ Images – We may use images of your child to promote Scouting. These images may be used in our recruitment or in other printed publications that we produce, as well as on our websites. First names only will be published. Our Scout Group may be visited by the media or to take photographs or film of a visiting dignitary or other high-profile event. Your Son or Daughter will often appear in these images, which may appear in local or national newspapers or on televised news programs. – If this doesn't suit your circumstances, then please arrange to see your section leader and we can help come to a solution.
- ❖ E-mail addresses – will be used to share information about the Scout Group to arrange events and support.

To hold this 'sensitive personal data' we will need your consent. This can be given by completing and signing the Parent / Guardian signature on the form provided.

All of the information will be used only in connection with your Son's or Daughter's membership of the Scout Association in the United Kingdom. This will include membership management and communications. None of the information provided will be passed to any third parties outside of the Scout Association.

We would be grateful if you could complete the forms and return them in a sealed envelope to your section leader.

This is a pre-requisite of your young person's joining the 38th South West Cheshire Scout Group.

Details of Members

The information which you give on this form will be used by the leader of your son's / daughter's section. The leaders will keep a reference copy and a further copy will go to the treasurer (for subscription and Gift Aid purposes only)

You will be asked to complete one of these forms every year to ensure that records are kept up to date.

Remember to inform one of your section leaders of any changes to the details shown on the Membership Details form that happen during the year.

Data Protection Act

As a charity, the Group does not have to register with the information commissioner's office. However, the Group is still subject to compliance with the Data Protection Act. We do ask if you object to your personal details being kept on a computer system for Group purposes of administration to inform the GSL or section leader so we make alternative arrangements.

We would stress that information held on computers is only available for use within Scouting and is treated with respect. Passing data relating to young people is in fact illegal!

Communication with Parents

The Scout Group generates lots of information and instructions for Members and their Parents / Guardians. You will find that the leaders of each section have their own preferred mechanisms, but these include:

- Online Scout Manager (OSM)
- This is the platform that we try to use as much as possible. It allows parents/carers to see what events and activities are upcoming and is often used to send out group information. It also allows parents/carers to view and update personal information regarding their young person(s) e.g. change of contact details, updated health information, allergies etc. You will be invited to log into Parent Portal so that you can update your child's details. Please keep them as up to date as possible.
- WhatsApp parent groups
 - Each Section has a Parents WhatsApp group where information is discussed. You will be invited to join when your Young Person joins the Group. Please ask for further information
- Emails giving programme updates and reminders. These often come through OSM.
- Facebook for general updates, events and discussions. The Group has 2 Facebook pages

We make every effort to rationalise the information but it is important that you read and respond promptly to messages to ensure that your young person does not miss out.

It goes without saying that if you have any questions or concerns; please raise them with the appropriate Section leader or with Duncan Batty, the Group Chair.

Note: If you need to talk to a leader there tends to be more time at the end of the meeting rather than beforehand. Often email or a text message saying that you would like a chat also helps too.



Health

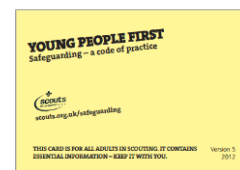
The Scout Association rules stipulate that no child is allowed to undertake any activity without a Health information form. All the information is stored electronically on our database [Online Scout Manager \(OSM\)](#), see below.

For Adventurous Activities, Days out and other one-off events, a separate paper form will need to be completed. You will be sent a permission form ahead of the planned event, which will include a health information section. **Please include anything that may be relevant to the activity on that form, including dietary restrictions and return it promptly to the Leadership Team.**

Safety

The Scout Association takes pride in its safety record. Guidance is provided to leaders through their District and County support to ensure that Scouting activities are as safe as possible but remain fun and adventurous. Safety issues are covered extensively in our leader training.

For more adventurous activities such as water sports, caving and mountaineering, we have special authorisation arrangements to ensure scouts are in safe hands.



Child Protection

The Scout Association's child protection policy is known as the 'Young People First' policy

It is often referred to as the 'Yellow card' policy because of the pocket-sized yellow reminder card all adults are asked to keep and carry with them.

The 'Young People First' policy is held up as an example of best practice and praised by the child protection agencies. The Scout Association also enjoys the confidence and trust of thousands of parents who each week place their children in our care.

It is the policy of The Scout Association to safeguard the welfare of all members by protecting them from physical, sexual, emotional harm. The Scout Association is committed to:

- ❖ Taking into account in all its considerations and activities the interests and wellbeing of young people;
- ❖ Respecting the rights, wishes and feelings of the young people with whom it is working;
- ❖ Taking all reasonably practicable steps to protect them from physical, sexual and emotional abuse, and
- ❖ Promoting the welfare of young people and their protection within a relationship of trust.

All adults aged eighteen or over, no matter what their role or involvement within scouting, are responsible for putting this policy into practice at all times.

If you would like a copy of the Yellow Card, please ask your young person's Section Leader

Safety and Wellbeing

Scouting continues to hold the safety and wellbeing of your child with utmost importance. It is therefore the Policy of The Scout Association that every adult in Scouting should complete a 'DBS' check (DBS – Disclosure & Barring Service). This means that any adult (18 or over) who holds a role within our organisation be it Cub Leader, Group Treasurer, or Group Chair has a DBS certificate. This is managed at by the Scout District, in our case South West Cheshire, who in turn follow The Scout Association's policies to Keep Young People in our care safe from harm.

Parental Support & Adult Help

Scouting depends on its Adult Volunteers and we would welcome your involvement.

As a parent of a Group member, as a minimum we expect you to help out for one evening with your young person's section each term if required and support any fundraising activities the Group run every year.

Maybe you could help in one or more of the following ways and join the adventure that is Scouting, offering adults as well as young people adventure and excitement!

Did you know that we can offer you;

Nationally recognised training, typical qualifications can include first aid, and qualifications in activities, such as climbing, water sports, sailing, archery to mention a few.

- ❖ You can also achieve tutoring qualifications in any of our activities
- ❖ Offering a skill to help train or help one of the sections for a badge or award.
- ❖ Help prepare refreshments for a Group or Section event
- ❖ Help to transport some members to any event away from our HQ
- ❖ Support the Scout Group at Social events
- ❖ Support the Groups fundraising activities
- ❖ Join the Executive committee and help manage the Scout Group
- ❖ Look after the Waiting List
- ❖ Help with second hand Uniform and kit shop
- ❖ Help maintain our HQ

There is no payment for becoming a leader (expect basic expenses) but you can expect lots of fun and laughs and lots of likeminded friends.



Fundraising for a new HQ

The Group has its own Headquarters on Davenport Avenue in Nantwich. Unfortunately, the buildings over 50 years old and after all those years of service have now been condemned and we cannot use them for meetings.

We are in the process of raising funds for the new building. Unfortunately we've not yet met anyone with a spare £250K that they are willing to donate to the Group. Realistically we will need to raise £250,000- £350,000 to complete our new HQ. We have made a great start since the Pandemic, and we ask all parents, leaders, supporters, friends and family, to help as much as they can.

Gift Aid

If whoever pays the Subs for each Young Person is a UK Tax Payer, then the Group can claim the tax back. Currently this is 25% on all donations. It doesn't cost you a penny, but it is a great help to the Group and helps keeps the costs down. Please fill in the form below and pass it onto any leader.

Join the Fundraising committee

The Group has a Fundraising Committee that organises events throughout the year. We are always on the lookout for more volunteers. If you have any ideas of events, this is the team that can make it happen. Please see a leader for details

Sponsored Events

This can be anything from getting yourself sponsored for an activity e.g. Marathon, 10K run, sitting in a bath of beans, the list is endless. Also check with your place of employment, as quite a few have a 'Match Funding' scheme – the employer will give £1 for each £1 raised, usually up to an upper limit.

Passive Fundraising

The Group has signed up to Easyfundraising. Easyfundraising is a scheme where, once you are signed up, any qualifying on-line purchases will automatically generate a small donation for the Group. See the Appendix on how to sign up.

Badge, Uniform and Equipment

Each Section has its own Uniform, although the activity trousers are common to all sections. Specific activities may have additional requirements and with any luck, you will be notified of these in good time by your Section leader.

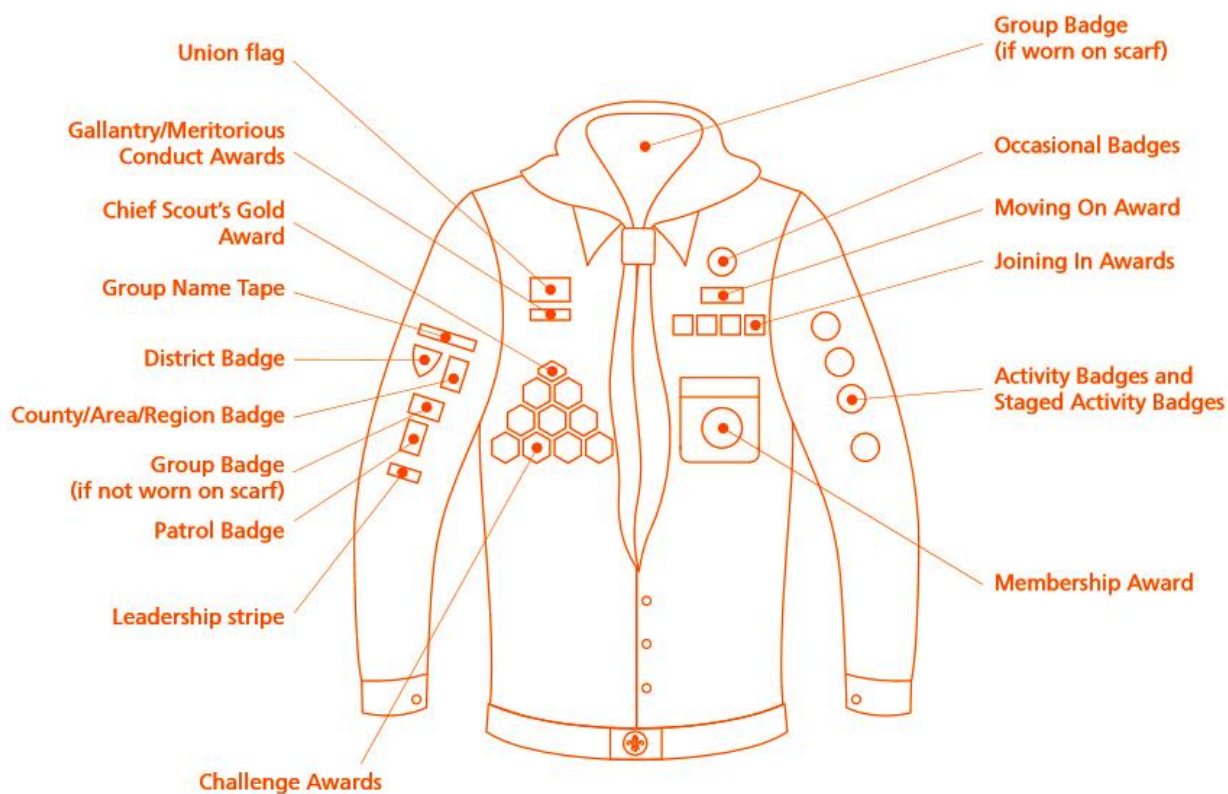
